


PUBLIC RELATIONS

Director's Note:

Last year, around this time, the musical *Little Shop of Horrors* had just closed, and Steve and I were busy taking down the set. I believe it was Steve who said, "Well, what are we doing next year?" I'll admit I had no idea. That is until the next week when Ms. Rabinovich said, "You should do *A Raisin in the Sun*." It was the perfect choice for many reasons. I didn't know it at the time, but *A Raisin in the Sun* has a long history with LWA and specifically the senior class. The seniors first encountered this play in 8th grade English class when they read it out loud with Mrs. R. on Google Meet during the COVID lockdown. So, the play you will see tonight is a culmination of several years.

A Raisin in the Sun was the first play, written by a Black female playwright, Lorraine Hansberry, to be put on Broadway, as well as the first with a Black director, Lloyd Richards. Ten years ago, Kenny Leon won the Tony for Best Director for Raisin's revival, and a few months ago he graciously gave his time to have a Zoom session with our cast. Last month, Andrew Barth Feldman came to LWA to teach an acting workshop and offer feedback on scenes our students performed during his workshop.

Today, you will see the best of LWA. You will see a group of very diverse students (both idealistically and demographically) come together to perform one of America's greatest plays. The play, which was born from the poem "A Dream Deferred" by Langston Hughes, deals with issues such as dreams, family, money, and race. The play sends a warning to all of us. The ignorant practice of racism, sexism or bigotry slowly kills the hopes of good men and women, turning us all into raisins in the sun. We hope you enjoy and learn from the performance you are about to see. Thank you for coming.


MIDDLE SCHOOL AND UPPER SCHOOL CONCERT


MUSICAL PERFORMANCE
